BRIEF DESCRIPTION

Very large perennial grass, with 20–30 mm wide leaf blades. Inflorescence a simple spike-like panicle, involucral bristles plumose.

HABITAT

Terrestrial.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

Robust tufted perennial grass to 3 m or more. **Rhizome** 6 mm diameter. **Leaf-blade** up to 75 cm \times 3 cm, flat with numerous fine appressed hairs. **Culm internodes** with fine hairs for some distance below inflorescence. **Panicle** 14 \times 2 cm, cylindric and spike-like.
