DISTRIBUTION

Endemic. North and South Islands - uncommon north of the Waikato

HABITAT

An abundant species of coastal, lowland and montane to subalpine wetlands, swamps, bogs and mires. Also in wet places within riparian forest. Most common in lowland to montane wetlands.

FAC: Facultative

Commonly occurs as either a hydrophyte or non-hydrophyte (non-wetlands).

Violet/Purple, White

ETYMOLOGY

lyallii: Named after David Lyall (1817-1895), 19th century Scottish naturalist and surgeon with the Royal Navy, who explored Antarctica, New Zealand, the Arctic and North America and was a lifelong friend of Sir Joseph Hooker.
