SIMILAR TAXA

Spreading crown of leaves and stout woody stem; stems up to 2m high and 4cm diameter; woody and leafless in lower parts with distinct leaf scars; stems have pith in the centre and are hollow in parts; flowers are numerous, white to purplish; fruit are dark brown 12-18mm long (Webb et al., 1988).

Violet/Purple, White

LIFE CYCLE

Long-lived seed bank - more than a year (Carol West, pers. comm.).
Biennial or perennial (Webb et al., 1988).
